The Eyes of Freedom: Lima Company Memorial

On May 10th the *Eyes of Freedom Traveling Tribute* will be traveling through Swanton on its way to the Museum & Welcome Center of Fulton County (our back yard). It is expected to be traveling through Swanton about 2pm in the afternoon and everyone is welcome to come out and line the streets as it comes through. 8848 OH-108 in Wauseon (by the fairgrounds).



Just what is this all about?

The Eyes of Freedom: Lima Company Memorial is an interactive traveling tribute since 2008 whose mission is to "Honor the Service & Sacrifice of all who answer our Nation's Call." Through the life sized portraits of the fallen Marines and Navy Corpsman of Lima Company are accurate likenesses of 23 specific men, their eyes reflect the thousands of men and women who have given their lives and served our Nation. Their own boots stand a t the base of their portraits, making even more personal the gift of their service. The Eyes of Freedom Memorial, painted by acclaimed artist, Anita Miller, and delivered to you by their official transportation provided, R&L Carriers, is a living traveling tribute that reminds us of the costs of freedom. Lima Company is a Marine reserve unit and remains one of the hardest hit units in Operation Iraqi Freedom.

In addition to the oil paintings, they recently added a life sized bronze sculpture entitled "Silent Battle" to honor the losses due to post traumatic stress and veteran suicide. This powerful and emotional work illustrates the difficulty that many veterans experience as they navigate life after combat. The same artist worked with an army veteran who knows well the pain of post traumatic stress and who has lot many comrades-in-arms to suicide. He instructed the artist by saying, "The first step in healing is to know we aren't alone."

The traveling memorial will be on display from May 11th through May 18th. There is no charge to visit and tour the memorial, but they will gratefully accept donations (which are tax deductible) if you desire. Please take time to look at their website and information and, if you can, go see the memorial yourself while it is in our backyard.

Decoration Day

May 5, 1865 - Decoration Day was first observed in the U.S., with the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves from the Civil War with flowers. The observance date was later moved to May 30th and included American graves from World War I and World War II, and became better known as Memorial Day. In 1971, Congress moved Memorial Day to the last Monday in May, thus creating a three-day holiday weekend.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo—which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.

The FIRST Boy Scout World Jamboree

Olympia, London, England, 1920. The first World Jamboree. 8000 Scouts from 34 countries represented at the roll call. The site, a huge glass-roofed building covering six acres whose concrete floor had to be covered with earth for the competitions.

Some non-Scout participants: an alligator from Florida, a baby crocodile from Jamaica, a lioness cub from Rhodesia, monkeys South Africa, a baby elephant, a camel...........B-P. acclaimed Chief Scout of the World...."If it be your will, let us go forth from here fully determinated that will we be develop among ourselves and our boys that comradeship, through the world-wide spirit of the Scout Brotherhood, so that we may help to develop peace and happiness in the world and good will among men"

In a brief thought, Lord Baden-Powell believed that if youth from all over the world could become united in a common goal and become friends while doing it that we could possibly eliminate wars. Friends would understand each other and would not want to fight. (from the editor)

The first Jamboree did not have an official badge, one of the few contingent badges was the one from South Africa. This year will be the 24th World Scout Jamboree being held at Bechtel Summit in West Virginia

The Boy Scout Handbook

Why was the original handbook significant?

ORIGINAL EDITION - In 1910 the Boy Scouts of America created a temporary edition of the Scout Handbook while developing its first edition. Ernest Thompson Seton, BSA's Chief Scout, wrote "A Handbook of Woodcraft, Scouting, and Life-craft". It served as the official handbook of the BSA into

FIRST EDITION - 1911-1914. The "Official Handbook for Boys" became the official manual for Boy Scouts. The organization of material was somewhat weak and some basic skills were not presented in this printing.

It is a descendant of Robert Baden-Powell's original handbook, Scouting for Boys, which has been the basis for Scout handbooks in many countries. The handbook is not just a guide to the outdoors - but a guide for life that addresses issues such as alcohol and drug abuse, respecting others, and using the Internet appropriately. (And as of February 1st, 2019 we now have the Scouts BSA Handbook for Boys and Scouts BSA Handbook for Girls !!)
